

Response to 'Child D' Serious Case Review and Domestic Homicide Review by Bristol Safeguarding Children Board and Bristol Safer Bristol Partnership

Introduction

This report presents the findings of a joint Serious Case Review and Domestic Homicide Review into the death of a 17 year old boy, referred to as Child D in the report at the request of his family. Child D's older brother entered a guilty plea to the charge of murder and is currently serving a life sentence. This review considers the involvement of professionals with the brothers, both of whom were described by those who knew them as bright, engaging and well-liked in the community. As Chairs of the Bristol Safeguarding Children Board (BSCB) and Safer Bristol Partnership (SBP) and on behalf of both the Boards, we would like to express our condolences to Child D's family and friends, and thank them for their time and input into this review.

Local Safeguarding Children Boards are required to conduct a Serious Case Review (SCR) when a child dies as a result of abuse or neglect. Community Safety Partnerships should consider conducting a Domestic Homicide Review (DHR) when the death of a person aged 16 or over has resulted from violence, abuse or neglect by a person to whom they were related. The BSCB and SBP decided to undertake a joint review in order to maximise learning, ensure a proportionate and considered response and minimise the impact of multiple reviews on family members. To this end, the Boards commissioned two independent reviewers, Sian Griffiths and Deborah Jeremiah, to lead the review considering both the safeguarding children perspective and the issues related to domestic homicides.

The circumstances surrounding Child D's death challenges us all to reconsider how we understand domestic abuse. The review finds that our professional systems are less robust in response to violence that does not involve partners in intimate relationships and highlights the need for more work and greater awareness raising. This requires the engagement of all professionals and members of the public too.

Child D and his brother's experiences highlight how violence can escalate with truly tragic outcomes. It also emphasises that we must continue give sufficient priority to work that ensures young men who have experienced trauma and difficulties in their childhoods, are supported effectively into adolescence and young adulthood. The two Boards are



committed to responding to the findings of this review, and working together to protect other families from similar harm in the future. You can find our full action plan below.
