Following a comprehensive assessment by the Care Quality Commission (CQC), Bristol City Council's Adult Social Care function has been officially rated as 'Good'.

The CQC inspection team spoke with many of our colleagues in different teams and in different roles, as well as partners across the council and externally.

Individuals and carers with lived experience of Adult Social Care in Bristol also shared their experiences through interviews and focus groups.

First Response our Children's Front Door is making some changes

As of the 23rd July 2025, all safeguarding referrals will be taken by phone at the Front Door, using exactly the same phone number we have now, 0117 903 6444.

Our webform will still take referrals for Targeted support services, formally known as Early Help/FIF.

The shift is to improve relations between agencies, and to ensure improved quality of information is obtained at the earliest point

This change will be trialled over the summer holidays and if it goes well then we will adopt the change permanently.

ETHICS DISCUSSION ON PROTEST

Policing has a vital role to facilitate peaceful protest, allowing individuals to express their views in line with the Human Rights Act "freedom of expression".

This is also an important opportunity to engage with members of the public on personal issues and to build trust and confidence with communities.

The ethical questions we can explore?

- **Is protest a vital tool in British democracy to raise awareness of views the public are passionate about and increase visibility?**
- **Should the restrictions placed on protest be more stringent to prevent any conflict between rival groups, in doing so, limiting the visibility and impact of protest?**
- **The impact of peaceful protest turning violent has a big impact on the public confidence in the ability of the police to maintain the King's peace. Is this sufficient reason to increase policing powers to restrict protests?**

Statutory Reviews

Domestic Abuse-Related Death Review publication

The Keeping Bristol Safe Partnership have published a Domestic Abuse-Related Death Review (DHR) which was commissioned following the suicide of Lauren (pseudonym) in March 2022. The primary purpose for undertaking DHRs is to enable lessons to be learned from a homicide or suicide where a person has died as a result of domestic abuse, violence or neglect from a person they were in a relationship with, related to, or were a member of the same household. This review examines the agency responses and support given to Lauren prior to her death in March 2022.

Families First Programme

In Bristol, we are committed to continually improving the support we provide to children and families. To do this, we know that we need to regularly review our services and implement changes that adapt to the needs of our communities. We have launched our Families First Programme, which will provide the right support to families at the right time and will improve outcomes for children.

What is the Bristol Families First programme?

Bristol City Council children's senior leadership team has developed a 12-month programme to respond to the local and national changes that are required. The programme is service-led, with seven of our Bristol Children's Services workforce seconded -each responsible for delivering one of the areas of focus. We are delivering Families First alongside our workforce and co-designing the programme with children, families, and our carers to ensure it reflects lived experiences.

The programme is working to prioritise earlier help and support for children, families and carers to ensure our children remain in their families and communities whenever possible. Where children are not able to safely remain in their family network, the Families First programme also includes projects focused on ensuring children are able to live in stable homes, which are best suited to their needs and which support them maintaining relationships in their networks, and accessing education.

What happens if we get this right?

For our children

- We will provide our children with the right support at the right time so that more of our children remain at home with their families
- When children do have to enter care more will remain in or closer to Bristol, their families, networks and communities
- Our children and their wider family network will have a greater voice in decisions made about their care

For our partners

- We will create the conditions for earlier, more planned work with families – reducing the need for crisis responses and giving you more time to focus on what matters most.
- We will reduce pressure on your services by targeting support earlier and more effectively – helping families before challenges escalate.
- We will strengthen joint working by embedding shared practice approaches – so when you encounter a crisis, you're equipped to respond in ways that mirror our own.

For our workforce

- We get involved with children and families earlier enabling more children to remain at home.
- We can make informed decisions that drive improved outcomes for children because we have better data.
- Less children enter care because we are able to intervene earlier.
- If we get all this right we will have the capacity to work with children and families more pro-actively.

Bristol Night Light

Night Light is a collaboration between Barnardo's, Avon and Somerset Police and Bristol City Council and is an innovative way of safeguarding children and young people at risk of sexual exploitation and other harms.

Night Light operates from 10pm–4am and works alongside adult street sex workers to identify children at risk and perpetrators. Jo Ritchie, from Barnardo's and Rose Brown from Avon and Somerset Police have been working on this project since its inception during Covid, building trust with the women and enabling this project to excel.


